Organised by the European Public Health Alliance Environment Network (EEN) in collaboration with Physicians for Social Responsibility (PSR)

Purpose

This training programme will aim to strengthen the network of the key leaders in the European health and environment community to improve the role of health community in advocacy efforts with the EU institutions and international organizations on environment and health issues. The meeting will consist of time to a) share experiences/programs/materials, b) set environmental and health policy priorities that are most suited to advocacy by the European health community, c) participate in hands-on advocacy and media training, and d) individual meetings between participants and policy makers. The training portion is designed as a "train-the-trainers" approach so that participants can return to their organizations and conduct further training.

Objectives

- Build the capacity of European-based health care and public health organisations in advocacy communication related to environment and health policy issues;
- Share experiences from across Europe and other countries on what has been done in terms of advocacy tools, campaigns, methodologies;
- Strategize on how best to work together to influence the EU and wider European region's agendas;
- Identify concrete activities that EEN, as a European umbrella organization, can carry out to promote and strengthen the advocacy capacity of the health sector.

The political landscape provides the context from which to view environment and health policy advocacy. A Member of European Parliament and Member of the Council will be asked to provide their viewpoint on key milestones in EU Environment & Health policy priorities over the next 3-5 years.

Each group will identify the main priorities for advocacy in the next 3-5 years and discuss criteria used for deciding such priorities in order to share back in the plenary. The group discussion will draw upon what participants have heard from the EU institutional perspective, the health professional perspective, and the media perspective, and participants own policy priorities which may or may not be on the political agenda.

Participants will learn effective strategies in lobbying EU institutions and developing campaigns. An ongoing EEN campaign priority (such as Chemicals or Mercury reduction) will be used as a case study. Participants will also contribute their own ideas for local or national campaigns. Participants will also discuss and strategize about how best to train their networks of health professionals.

One outcome from this session would be participant's ideas on how they could contribute to EEN's campaigns, and steps to start or further build on their own campaigns.

Additional priorities to those of EEN would be gathered to look at further development in a later session or future EEN work, or other platforms that could take priorities forward.
